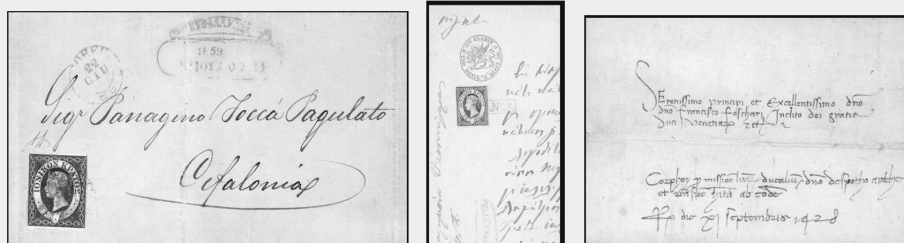
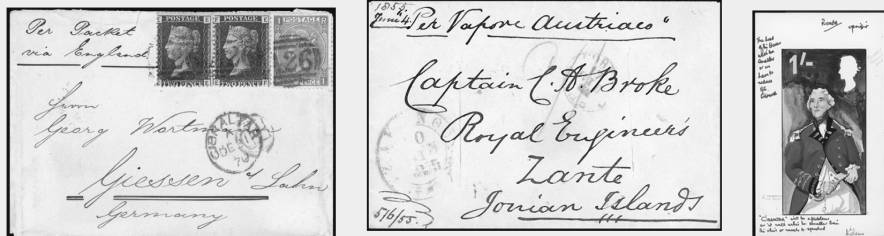

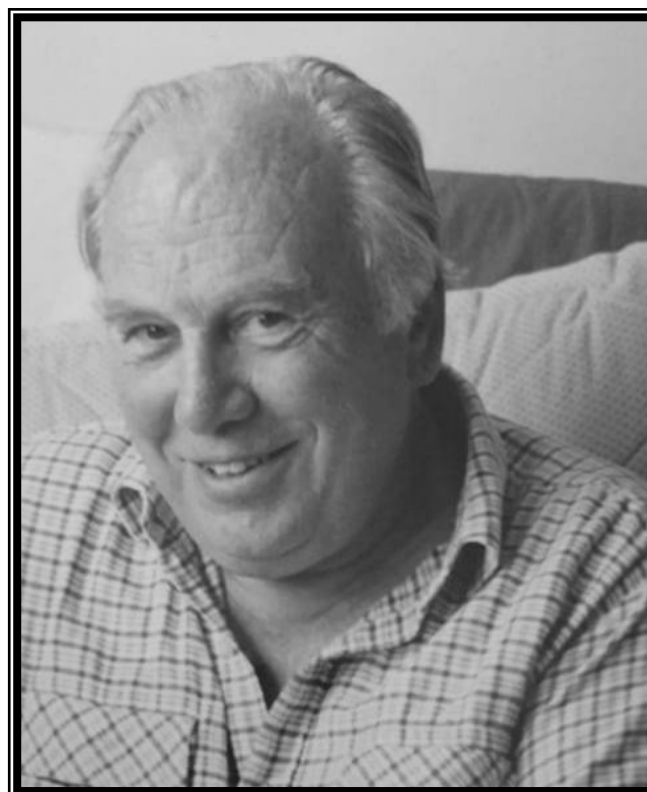
The evenings comprise invited talks and displays and the average attendance at meetings is about 25.

Meeting 27th March, 2017...
Southampton & District Philatelic Society's Visit...

A certain mystery always surrounds an evening when the club is to be entertained by philatelists from afar!! Keeping up this 'exchange' tradition always proves most worthwhile, as demonstrated by the response to this particular meeting. Three fascinating displays featured, the first being *'Bishop's Waltham'* by Mike Batty (his own village!!) who produced a highly detailed historical and social journey through the interplay of philatelic material. Included were pre-post documents dating from 1773 onwards... cancels- some first day, red and blue wax seals, covers, letters...much to/from solicitors, printed postal stationery, bills, maps, rates, transatlantic mail and so much more. This 90 sheet display was a gem and profoundly well presented via excellent write-up and exposition. Brian Hague followed after the customary break, with his superb *'Jutlandia'* study. Launched in 1934, this Danish cargo ship clearly had an eventful history. After considerable cargo work, the ship was provided by the government to act as a hospital ship in the Korean War, manned by volunteers. Again a wonderful write-up, the display took in photos, covers, airmails, postcards, details of cargoes and routes. A menu card was of interest too, as were the letters to/from crew members. The final presentation came from John Berridge... *'Hindenburg Air Ship'*. ...mainly in the 1936/7 period. This visual feast included construction details, air-stamps, mini-sheets, covers, letters, photos, tickets, technical information and routes. The airship achieved 140 Atlantic crossings, 130k passengers, one million miles...a real business competitor. Its first trans-Atlantic flight in 1936 to South America was well documented, as were later navigations and of course the final disaster...the fire/crash in the USA, in May 1937. Some 300 covers exist from this very flight!! Here were displayed numerous philatelic gems, some being unique items. Bob Small warmly thanked the three speakers and showed much enthusiasm for the material shared, much of which would have been a considerable challenge to collect. Again, as Chairman, he was able to show much appreciation and the Club greatly endorsed the presentation of engraved whisky tumblers...only sorry they were not suitably filled since Bob had not travelled to his Scottish distillery in a while!!

Mr. Neville Carr who was to complete his display of India – The Jewel in the Crown.

Mr Carr commenced his display by reminding members of the size and diversity of India. He explained how in his previous display he had shown the stamps of Queen Victoria and was now going to display those of the three Kings who succeeded her.

To begin with Mr. Carr showed a latest acquisition to compliment his collection of the 1852 issue. He had managed to purchase a copy of the official reprint of the 4 Anna stamp with an inverted head, made in 1891. This was still a rare item even in this condition.

Mr Carr then went on to display the stamps of King Edward VII. De la Rue had the contract to print the stamps of India. They replicated the last stamps of Queen Victoria for the new reign by changing the monarchs and increased the range of values up to 25 Rupees. Mint and used examples of all stamps were shown. A specially cancelled sheet for the Coronation Durbar was shown using the stamps of Queen Victoria as the Kings stamps had not been issued in time for the event.

A change in postal rates necessitated the overprinting of stamps with ¼ Anna. The plate used was that made for similar purposes during Queen Victoria's reign and so the constant varieties are the same. Many of these varieties were shown including the inverted ¼ Anna which is only known. The last stamp for British India was another surcharge where the

postally used. Examples of lady Minto's Red Cross fete cancellation were shown as were examples of stamp booklets issued between 1906 and 11.

The accession of George V resulted in De la Rue issuing a completely new series of definitive up to the Value of 25 rupees. Varieties were shown including the 'R' flaw on the 3 Pies stamps and a double print of the ½ Anna. Examples of the special cancellation for the 1911 Durbar were shown followed by examples on Indian Field Post Office cancellation on 'On Active Service' cards.

A study of the 1921 9 pies overprint stamp was shown. The surcharge was a result of increased postage rates and was produced locally. Mr. Carr explained that there were 2 settings, not mentioned by gibbons, and that a number of varieties exist, of which a number were shown, including a '9 9' and 'Pies Pies' in both settings. Inverted and double overprints were also shown.

The need for a ¼ Anna stamp resulted in further overprints again using the Victorian surcharge. Again constant varieties occur and many were shown.

Examples of the Prince of Wales' tour cancellations were shown along with examples of the 1924 Everest expedition cards and labels.

The last De la Rue's issue was a change of colours in the definitive stamps due to U.P.U. regulations. Essays of stamps proposed for printing in India were also displayed.

The second part of Mr Carr's display was the stamps printed by Nasik in India after 1926. Nasik reprinted the definitive stamps using De la Rue's plates, the only difference being a change of watermark from single to multiple star. Examples of tete beche pairs from booklet printings were shown. In 1929 Nasik produced airmail stamps, all with the same scenes. A number of varieties were shown, including offsets, 1 instead of 2 in India and the 'missing tree top' variety. The inauguration of new Government Building in New Delhi was commemorated. Stamps with inverted watermarks and the variety 'F for P in Purana' and a double vignette.

In 1932 Nasik produced their first definitive followed in 1935 with the Silver Jubilee stamps. The 'Bird on parapet' flaw was shown. Various booklets were also shown.

In 1936 new definitive for King George VI were issued, pictorials were introduced for the first time. The designs and values were changed in 1942. Tete beche pairs, produced for booklets were shown along with the 'Missing Pearl' variety. Various censored covers were displayed as was the victory issue.

very laid-back and his longest report at committee was invariably "We are solvent". But when we needed to argue for support from the Philatelic Great and Good, Joe was on the train to London with me to give his support.

Like many of his friends, I have been regaled by images of Joe's lunches, his sense of humour and his political Facebook postings.

Joe set himself the task of writing up all of his stamp collection and gave his friends a progress report with each Christmas letter. Sadly that task is incomplete. Before his last cruise Joe promised to send me a postcard from the Caribbean. His postcard from St Lucia arrived the day after I learned of his death.

The Hampshire Federation will miss Joe greatly. And so will I.

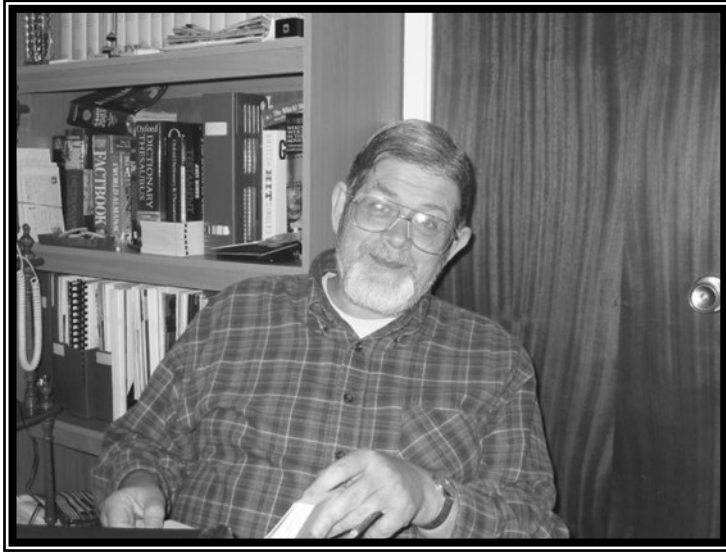

Joe Robertson 1947-2017...



Our Treasurer, Joe Robertson, was taken ill during his winter cruise in the Caribbean. He was flown back to the UK and sadly died in Winchester Hospital on the 25th January 2017. His funeral took place in Dublin and a remembrance of Joe's Life was held near Basingstoke at the end of March where Joe's friends from all walks of his life including philately and finance came together to remember the great times we had in his company.

Joe 'stepped up to the plate' as HPF Treasurer in June 2005. In fact he rarely missed a meeting after taking on the Treasurer's job. Joe was a member of many local stamp clubs as well as the Malay Study Circle and the Postage Due Mail Study Group. 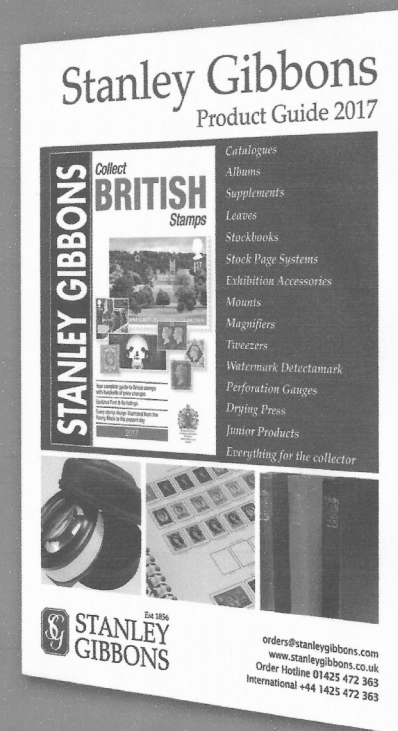

to Australia and New Zealand. Competition from foreign ships increased; from 1886 French ships offered a service via the Mediterranean, transhipped at Suez, and south-east to Singapore, Malaya and on to Australia and New Zealand. In 1901 the German Nordeutsche/Lloyd Line commissioned a large steamship, which at full steam consumed 500 tons coal/day, for the run. A selection of covers from this period, including a 'Sailor's Rate' 1d, Postcard 1 ½ d and a cover with an additional 1d 'Ship's Bag' were on display. The turn of the century saw the opening of the Goldfields in Western Australia which increased the sailings between Sydney/Melbourne and South Australia (Adelaide) and Western Australia (Esperance). In 1905 a large pipeline (approx. 1,5 diam.) and a railway line were built between Esperance and the goldfields some 350 miles inland. (The pipeline is still going in 21st century!)

After WW1 returning some Australian airmen brought planes home with them, and started using them to carry supplies, including mail, between Australian cities and towns, which speeded-up the post once it had reached Australia. In 1929 Imperial Airways established a route between London and Karachi, and Australian postal services by which mail collected at Sydney was flown to Freemantle, transferred to ship to Karachi and then by air to London – a journey of 14 days, but still much quicker than by sea! In 1931 3 experimental flights were made between London and Sydney, and in December a regular air service was opened between UK and Australia. With regular flights from UK to USA established, trials were made, using a Boeing 314 seaplane, of a trans-Pacific route, and in 1937 San Francisco – Hong Kong-Australia and San Francisco-Hong Kong-Fiji-New Zealand air routes were established. By 1940 a regular trans-Pacific airmail service was well established with a letter rate of 5/10d per ½ oz., and postcard rate of 2/4d.

His philatelic interests were the postal history of Farnham and district and the French Napolionic War period on which he had arguably the most comprehensive collection in the world. He had written articles on the subject and collaborated with other authors.

He also had a very comprehensive collection of Farnham postcards.

He was a very generous and kind person, always looking out for material for other members of the Society and had helped dispose of collections of deceased members without wanting any return for himself. In his retirement he could be found helping on stalls at fairs etc.

Not content with his philatelic interests he was also a very keen numismatist. Indeed, his interest in coins had preceded his philatelic interest. He collected early English and Chinese coins. He had been elected an Hon. Fellow of the Royal Numismatic Society in 1999, one of only 29 Fellows.

By profession he was a chartered accountant and had worked for the local Farnham accountants Milne Eldridge from leaving Farnham Grammar School.

At his funeral messages were read out from as far away as The USA and Hong Kong expressing their sadness at his passing. He had helped authors all over the world in their efforts to produce books.

He will be sadly missed by his many friends and his premature death has

meant that a lot of research work and publication will now not take place.

19th Century Australian and New Zealand Mail Colin Tabart...

There was no regular Australian Mail service prior to 1788, but by early 19th century routes to the east had been established via Atlantic, Mediterranean and overland to north India, and then south via Malaya, Singapore and on to Sydney. The first letter from Australia to Liverpool that is known was sent in 1823, but by the 1830s a mail service had been established between Liverpool and Sydney, with onward transmission from Sydney to Swan River, Western Australia in 1833, and to New Zealand (1840) and 1843 a missionary sent a letter to another missionary. (in Colin's display). In 1845 the first Steam Packet boats were in use via Mediterranean, then overland and on to other ships for the journey south-eastward. About this time duplicate letters were beginning to be written, with one letter being carried on a first ship and the duplicate on the next. Such duplicates are hard to come by, but a pair from 1846 was shown. The volume of mail increased, and although the Australian States remained separate entities, virtually all mail arrived at either Melbourne or Sydney, and onward transmission was by coastal packet steamers. With increasing quantity of mail, there was growing competition to carry letters, and more effort was made to speed the mail. Royal Mail opened contracts to carry the mail, and the Royal Navy, with ships in European and Australian waters obtained a contract, but its other duties sometimes interfered with the Royal Mail contract, and the contract was withdrawn and passed to commercial ships. The introduction of steamships resulted in faster mail over a few years the time taken for letters to reach Australia was reduced from 100+ to around 60 – 70. Steamships often carried sets of sails to us when winds were fair to reduce the consumption of coal. (Ships were reported as using up to 500 tons/day on occasions!).

By the 1860s shipping companies were looking for faster routes, and attention turned to the Pacific Ocean routes, with overland transshipment across the Americas. The first mail on this route was via Panama, but the health problems with yellow fever led to more northerly routes via San Francisco and New York. Later, with the introduction of the Empire Rate postage, much mail went via Canada, through Vancouver and Newfoundland. The closing decades of the 19th century saw the formation of many shipping lines, and in 1888 the Post Office introduced a weekly service

The Scottish Additional Halfpenny Mail Tax 1813-1839 & The Welsh Additional Halfpenny Mail Tax 1836-1839...

The new ‘Additional ½’ book, updating Hodgson & Sedgewick’s 2nd edition of 1984, was officially published in April at the SPS AGM weekend in Edinburgh.

Entitled “The Scottish Additional Halfpenny Mail Tax 1813-1839 & The Welsh Additional Halfpenny Mail Tax 1836-1839” it was compiled by Ian Baker, David Graham, Michael Sanig and Bill Shand. The A4 size book of 385 pages includes chapters with new information on the ‘Exempt Towns’ and the ‘Carlisle Red’ handstamp. The catalogue sections illustrate most of the handstamps on cover, in addition to including new marks and updating dates of use. The Appendix sections cover the mailcoach services from Edinburgh, Glasgow and some other routes and also include a wealth of information from major Scottish city directories for the mid-1830s.

Colin Tabeart signs Roll of Distinguished Philatelists...

Hampshire postal historian **Colin Tabeart** has been elected as a signatory of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists. An expert in postal rates and maritime subjects of 19th-century Great Britain, Colin Tabeart's first published work was *British and Overseas Letter Rates 1657 to 1900* in 1989. A revised, second edition was published in 2003.

Among his other major published works are *Robertson Revisited, A Study of the Maritime Postal Markings of the British Isles Based on the Work of Alan W. Robertson*; *Robertson Revisited, A Supplement 2016*; *Admiralty Mediterranean Packets 1830 to 1857*; *British West African Mail Packets*; and *Australian New Zealand UK Mails to 1880* and a second volume covering the years 1881-1900.

Colin Tabeart is a fellow and past president of the Society of Postal Historians and editor of the journal of the Forces Postal History Society. He also has written more than 90 articles for various publications.
